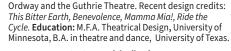

n the wake of the Supreme Court's 1954 decision Brown v. Board of Education, James Meredith tried to integrate Ole Miss by applying in 1961. When he informed the university that he was African American, his admission was delayed and obstructed, first by school officials and then by Mississippi Governor Ross Barnett. In a bid to block his enrollment, Barnett even had Meredith temporarily jailed. Multiple attempts by Meredith, accompanied by federal officials, to enroll were physically blocked. Hoping to avoid violence and ensure Meredith's enrollment, President Kennedy and Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy had a series of unproductive telephone negotiations with Barnett.

Ole Miss riot of 1962

(Sept 30 – Oct 1, 1962), also known as the Battle of Oxford, was a violent disturbance that occurred at the University of Mississippi—commonly called Ole Miss—in Oxford, Mississippi. Segregationist rioters sought to (I-r) James Meredith and Henry Gallagher

prevent the enrollment of African American veteran James Meredith, and President John F. Kennedy was forced to quell the riot by mobilizing over 30,000 troops, the most for a single disturbance in American history.

Integration in the South

The riot and the federal crackdown were a major turning point in the civil rights movement and resulted in the desegregation of Ole Miss—the first integration of any public educational facility in Mississippi. The final time troops were deployed during the civil rights movement, it is regarded as the end of the segregationist tactic of massive resistance. A statue of James Meredith now commemorates the event on campus, and the site of the riot is designated as a National Historic Landmark.

James Meredith

An American civil rights activist, writer, political adviser, and United States Air Force veteran he became. in 1962. the first African-American student admitted to the racially segregated University of Mississippi after the intervention of the federal government (an event that was a flash point in the civil rights movement). Inspired by President John F. Kennedy's inaugural address, Meredith decided to exercise his constitutional rights and apply to the University of Mississippi. His goal was to put pressure on the Kennedy administration to enforce civil rights for African Americans. The admission of Meredith ignited the Ole Miss riot of 1962 where Meredith's life was threatened and 31,000 American servicemen were required to quell the violence the largest ever invocation of the Insurrection Act of 1807.

Henry T. Gallagher

On Friday, September 28, 1962 the regular U.S. army 716th Military Police Battalion was placed on alert for possible duty in connection with the racial integration of the University of Mississippi by the impending enrollment of James Howard Meredith. Second Lieutenant Henry Gallagher, a recent college graduate from the State of Minnesota, was a platoon leader with the 716th, stationed

at Fort Dix, New Jersey. In the early hours of Sunday September 30, 1962 his battalion (650 officers and men) was airlifted to the U.S. Naval Air Station at Millington, Tennessee. Later that evening he was assigned to be the lead vehicle to escort the battalion by convoy from Millington to Oxford, Mississippi during the tumultuous night of the University of Mississippi riot. He would later serve as the principal military security officer for Mr. Meredith from October 1 through late November 1962 as the officer in charge (OIC) of a special security patrol assigned to protect him and any accompanying US. Marshals. He would return to Oxford from March 15 through May 8, 1963.

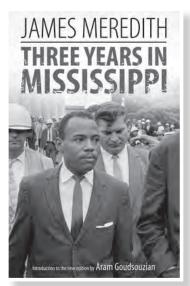
