



FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



A powerful vehicle to look at racism, redlining

We were in dress rehearsal for this show on March 14th of 2020, when the word came down that one of our company members was exposed to the virus. I remember walking onto the stage and calling in the casts of Not in our Neighborhood! and Not for Sale to give them the bad news: "We're going to have to shut down. The virus has gotten to us, but we'll be back."

Well, we're back, almost two years later!

This is Barbara Teed's family story, but it's bigger than that. Working with veteran playwright Kim Hines, Barbara's family story has become a powerful vehicle to look at racism and the history of redlining in our Twin Cities. Thank you, Barbara and Kim.

By the middle of the 20th century, the north side in Minneapolis was home to the city's largest concentration of African American families as was the Rondo neighborhood in St. Paul. This was NO accident. Our cities' racially restrictive covenants on property deeds prevented African Americans and other minorities from buying homes throughout the Twin Cities. As a result of these covenants and redlining practices, Minneapolis and St. Paul now have the lowest rate of homeownership among African American households of any U.S. city.

My wife and I own a home in St. Louis Park, and we recently discovered that the deed to our house has a racial covenant. We're currently working with JUST DEEDS to have this ugly slice

of history removed and we encourage each of you to do the same. Click here to learn more about Just Deeds.

FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT



We all have work to do

History is made up of stories that document people, places and things—significant and (seemingly) insignificant events; situations in time and space. How and what stories are passed down from generation to generation is determined by which people have the most power.

Since the new millennium, America has been not only challenged to tell more of its history, especially that which has been hidden for centuries, but to tell the truth of that history...the good stuff and the bad, warts and all.

I had initially been asked to write a script about the issues of redlining using stories of my parents, friends and even myself...but I felt that audiences had heard a lot of those stories already. I wanted to take the issue from a different angle, a different perspective; that's when Arnold Weigel's story came into view.

After reading Barbara Teed's play, "Leaving St. Paul," I felt that the play that I wanted to write for the History Theatre had to emphasize a couple of things: First, in order for disenfranchised groups to move forward, coalitions and friendships must be made with those who are perceived to be the "other," but in actuality are allies. The second thing that I wanted to emphasize was that not all pioneers and/ or heroes get trophies, money or prizes at the end of their mission. Many times, when you're the first to do anything

that challenges society's norms, you face a lot of anger, a swift kick in the backside, or shunning, which can lead to ruin - physical, emotional or both.

Arnold experienced all of those and then some. His motives and intent were sincere; his biggest flaw was to expect that his wife Ivah and their family would walk the battlefield of racism and classism; to suffer all of the anxiety, pain and anguish right along with him. Communities of Color could affirm Arnie's actions and commend him for his deeds—we have suffered even worse, so we understood the sacrifices he made.

The gift to Arnie and his family and people of their socioeconomic background, was that they experienced firsthand knowledge of the devastating effects of racism that Communities of Color experienced and continue to experience daily. This was, no doubt, something that drove Arnie to make the decisions that he made.

The gift for Communities of Color is that Arnie may not have destroyed the walls of racism, but he certainly cracked open the window of opportunities just enough so that the next round of heroes and pioneers could throw open that window wide!

For us, the audience, the gift is in witnessing this story and its telling of just how truly inequitable it is for certain citizens in this country, how far people in positions of power are willing to punish those who shift the paradigm to make this country livable for everyone, regardless of their skin color...and how it hasn't truly changed much.

My hope is that everyone who sees NOT FOR SALE realizes that we all have work to do!

FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT



It's the right thing to do.

I first heard this phrase from my father in 1965. I was a teen, coming of age, wanting acceptance from my peers. As my father's call to action became known in our all-white community, in the newspapers and on television, his peers turned against him. As did mine. My mother's journals are incorporated throughout the telling of this story.

I imagine my mother typing away on a 1960's Smith-Corona, and I wonder what she was feeling as her domain collapsed about her, trying to make sense of a community rejecting her and her husband for trying to make a difference in the world: "February 27, 1965... a date no one but this family places any significance to. A date that was the beginning of a maze faced by one American family because the head of the household made a public stand on open occupancy."

The adverse reaction by the Twin Cities community toward my father's plea to "slay the mighty dragon of discrimination" was not an isolated case. Indeed, Minnesota was as guilty as other states in preventing minority groups from peaceful integration. This has motivated me to believe that my family's story should not be forgotten.







Director



Arnold Weigel was a first-generation German; English was his second language until he began kindergarten. Arnold was born in Hebron, North Dakota. After his father died when Arnold was one year old, his mother moved her family to St. Paul across the street from Como Park.

Serving as a pilot in the United States Air Force in WWII, Arnold's first solo flight was flying through the Grand Canyon. After WWII ended, Arnold took advantage of the GI Education Bill and entered Hamline University in St. Paul leaving one semester short of graduation to follow the call of employment.


Arnold decided to sell houses. Applying his natural speaking ability and his personal charisma, he became a successful real estate agent selling homes in the Twin Cities. Arnold sold the American Dream of home ownership, not only to homogeneous families, but he marketed the Dream to minority families. Communities did not accept Arnold Weigel's ideal of integrating neighborhoods.

Arnold met Ivah Solberg, a first-generation Norwegian, on the campus of Hamline University. They married in Duluth in 1950. After having a daughter, Barbara, the family moved to the Twin Cities. When Barbara was in the sixth grade, Arnold moved his family to South St. Paul on a house overlooking the Upper Mississippi River Valley.

Arnold opened a second real estate office in South St. Paul; his other real estate office was in Falcon Heights. In 1965, Arnold was awarded the Distinguished Service Award for the State Of Minnesota by the National Association of Real Estate Boards. Because of his real estate awards and his successful businesses, he was asked to speak about "Race and Housing" at a conference. His speech was televised on local news stations and in the newspaper because interracial housing was very controversial.

Soon, Arnold's fellow real estate colleagues (his peers) began to campaign against him and "blackball" him. He lost clients who did not want to sell their house through a real estate agent that would sell a house to a minority group member. His family received threatening phone calls. His daughter Barbara experienced "racial bullying" by her high school classmates; her friend's parents would tell their children not to hang out with Barbara because her father was selling houses to minority families.

A. After the family moved in I would go next door, shake his hand, welcome him as a new neighbor, and hope he would accept me as a good friend.

Q: YOU HAVE TO ADMIT AS A REALTOR, THAT PROPERTY VALUES DECREASE IF COLORED FAMILIES MOVE INTO A NEIGHBORHOOD. HOW ABOUT IT? Mrs. S.I.J.

A. It certainly wouldn't decrease in value as far as my home is concerned since I'm not planning to go any place anyway. Just because a minority group moved into my neighborhood wouldn't cause the paint on my house to fade, my roof wouldn't start leaking, nor would it cause a change in the physical appearance of my house in any way that I can think of, so how can it change the value?

Arnold's weekly real estate column for the *South St. Paul Reporter* newspaper. Arnold answered questions from readers. He had his weekly column for about 3 years; the editor suddenly cancelled it, Ivah recalls in her journal. Ivah kept each column and put it in a scrapbook. 1965.

Arnold authored a real estate column for a newspaper and often wrote about integrated housing. He continued to sell houses to minority families. Soon, no one would let him sell their house, banks would not approve home mortgage loan money for his clients and would charge more money for a house loan or house insurance because the client was not white, and Arnold lost his own house.

Seven years later, he got back on his feet and started selling homes - but not privately. He lived to be 92 and despite the challenges he faced, he ALWAYS said it was the right thing to do. Arnold and Ivah are honored you are here today.



Realtor Asks Declaration On 'Rights'

Southeast suburban residents were urged Saturday to demand a joint statement of position on civil rights from all local governmental bodies.

Weigel said he has "yet to hear of a declaration on civil rights from city, village and town government in the southeast area,"

Weigel

We should let our elected officials know

that we want a "joint statement." he told the race and religion conference.

Said the realtor, "There's no other area of human rights that touches the vital nerve of the body politic like unequal housing."

Weigel said that a joint declaration acknowledging open occupancy and equality of treatment regardless of race would be desirable at this point in history.

"Instead of fear and trepidation, we could look with pride on our communities." Weigel said we could lead other suburban areas in the same direction. (above) Ivah kept a record of the impact Arnold's equal housing rights stand had on their social life. This page is from Ivah's journal. It shows their loss of social and community engagements due to rising tension about Arnold's open occupancy position. Ivah's category "Community Meetings" reflects her position as League of Women Voters president in South St. Paul, as a member of the South St. Paul Charter Committee, etc. She resigned from the League after members boycotted a meeting where her friend Pearl, a Black social worker, was a speaker. The Weigel's often entertained at home, most notably bridge or holiday parties. Their social circle shrank as Arnold's open housing speeches were printed in newspapers and shown on television. Ivah recorded this decline as a chart in her journal, a consequence of speaking out.

Glossary

Redlining

Home Owners' Loan Corporation (HOLC) instituted a redlining policy by developing color-coded maps of American cities using racial criteria to categorize lending and insurance risks. New, affluent, racially homogeneous housing areas received green lines while black and poor white neighborhoods were often circumscribed by red lines denoting their undesirability. Banks and insurers adopted HOLC's maps and practices to guide lending and underwriting decisions. The Federal Housing Administration used HOLC's methods to assess locations for federally insured new housing construction. Color-code maps often displayed in real estate offices.

Racial Steering

The practice by real estate agents of steering white home seekers into white areas, while steering equally creditworthy Black prospects into Black and racially changing areas. Brokers or agents "steer" a client to certain neighborhoods.

Refusal to Show/Refusal to Sell

Real estate agent refuses to show or sell property to minority groups; shows a minority family a house for sale at night or a house that is in disrepair; say an "Open House" is "done for the day."

Racially-Restrictive Deeds

Covenants embedded in property deeds to keep people who were not white from buying or even occupying land. Also called Restrictive Covenant.

Homogeneous Community

All members share a similar set of beliefs, values, and demographic characteristics. Tend to be comprised of individuals of the same race, nationality, and religious and political beliefs.

Color Tax

Up to \$1,000 added to a property because a person of color is purchasing it. Can refer to higher mortgage and insurance rates.

Slum/Ghetto

A slum is characterized by its run-down status; a ghetto is characterized by the people who live there.

Eminent Domain

The right of government to take private property for public purpose through condemnation and payment of fair value. A city can seize property for slum clearance or prevention.

Blackballed

To exclude socially; ostracize. To conspire to ruin someone's reputation until they become unemployable and people refuse to associate with them.

Blockbusting

"Real estate profiteering." Efforts of real estate agents to trigger turnover of white-owned homes to minorities. The agent purchases a white-owned home, sells it to a minority member, then spreads terrifying rumors among the neighbors. The worried homeowners quickly sell to the agent who reaps a high profit by inflating the price of the homes to minorities. Also called "panic selling." Agents often hired a person of color to walk the neighborhood to exaggerate white fears.

Glossary

Affirmative Action

Employers who contract with the government or who otherwise receive federal funds are required to document their affirmative action practices and metrics. Also called Equal Employment Opportunity. Racial quotas in employment are numerical requirements for hiring members of a racial group.

Federal Indian Reservation

An area of land reserved for a tribe or tribes under treaty or other agreement with the United States. Some reservations are the remnants of a tribe's original land base. Others were created by the federal government for the resettling of First Nation people forcibly relocated from their homelands.

Anti-Semitism

Hostility toward or discrimination against Jews as a religious, ethnic, or racial group.

The Fair Housing Act of 1968

Signed by President Lyndon B Johnson. Refusal to sell or rent a dwelling to any person because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Declared neighborhood integration a national goal.

Japanese American internment

The forced relocation by the U.S. government of Japanese Americans to detention camps during World War II.




